Founded in 1858, Carson City serves as the capital of the great state of Nevada—home to the three branches of government and five constitutional officers, including the governor. Part of the Great Basin, Carson City is host to a diverse landscape with the shores of Lake Tahoe just beyond the Carson Range to the west, and the Carson River and high desert to the east.

With a community of around 59,000 residents, there is an abundant parks system with over 8,000 acres of trails and open space—more parks per capita than the national average. As one of northern Nevada's premier outdoor recreation destinations, the city's nationally recognized trail system offers dramatic topography and breathtaking views.

Like to ski? We are in the epicenter of 14 ski resorts within 30 minutes to an hour, offering varied terrain for any ability level. Regardless of your chosen adventure, Carson City boasts many affordable hotels designed to make your stay enjoyable.

Where the Old West is met with a modern twist, be sure to explore the many restaurants and shops in our revitalized urban core. Built to provide safe, accessible and healthy travel, it provides wide, landscaped sidewalks, bike lanes and plenty of places to relax.

As you might expect, we in the Silver State are especially proud of our rich history. Home to the Nevada State Museum—which served as a United States Mint and is home to the Coin Press No. 1—history buffs and families alike will find a treasure trove of artifacts from across Nevada. Guided tours are available and developed to enhance your understanding of Nevada's colorful history. If you like railroads, take a tour of the Nevada State Railroad Museum or enjoy a 24-mile round-trip tour on V&T Railway from Carson City to Virginia City and back.

The Stewart Indian School Cultural Center & Museum is a gathering place for Great Basin Native Americans and their families. Operated by the Federal Bureau of Indian Affairs from 1890-1980, Stewart

Indian School taught English and vocational skills, eventually becoming a high school for Native students, providing education to more than 200 tribal nations. The federal assimilation policy took children from their families and caused historical trauma that still affects tribal communities today. The museum serves as a place for healing and aims to share first-person stories that educate others about the past.

Carson City is a thriving community—not just a collection of neighborhoods—cognizant of our past and its importance to who we are today. It is committed to creating a sustainable and vibrant community for the 21st century. With pride, we invite you to share in a bit of the lifestyle that we get to enjoy every day of the year.






## Carson City is Your First Stop

**1. Explore the treasures of Nevada's history**

Take in more than the Nevada Capitol Building's picturesque landscape—delve into history. The Battle Born Hall exhibit pays homage to trailblazers of the Nevada.

**2. See the city while mountain biking or hiking Ash to Kings Trail**

Calling all trail enthusiasts! Ash to Kings Trail is a 14-mile round trip trail that provides cyclists with panoramic views of the city.

**3. Take a day trip to Lake Tahoe**

No northern Nevada trip is complete without a day spent at majestic Lake Tahoe—just 25 minutes from downtown Carson City. You can even hike to hidden beaches!



#### 4. Kick up some dust on the Cap to Tahoe Trail

Hikers, backpackers and mountain bikers alike will enjoy this addition to the northern Nevada trails. Cap to Tahoe connects Carson City to the Tahoe Rim Trail and, by extension, the Pacific Crest Trail.

#### 5. Sip and savor in downtown Carson City

Explore downtown's many offerings. Be sure to grab a drink at Comma Coffee. Today it's a favorite for visitors and locals alike, but it has had an interesting history as a candy parlor, antique store, and a mortuary.

#### 6. Get minted at the Nevada State Museum

See the Coin Press No. 1 in action at the Nevada State Museum. Step back in time at the former Carson City Mint building, where coins were minted from 1870 to 1893.

#### 7. Tour the Nevada State Prison

After hiking the Prison Hill Loop, visit the former Nevada State Prison for a guided 90-minute tour. This prison functioned for 150 years and its quarry was used to build several of the most significant structures in Carson City.

#### 8. Take in some awe-inspiring murals

The annual Murals & Music Festival continues to color Carson City, bringing nearly 50 murals to the capital city. Grab a mural map and take in some truly incredible art all over the city.

#### 9. Catch a falling star at the Jack C. Davis Observatory

Stargaze and learn about celestial wonders at the observatory. Here, you can enjoy a quick walk through our solar system and read monuments that give you insights to each planet.

# LEGENDS OF THE CAPITOL

## Tour guide and history buff shares the hidden history of the Nevada State Capitol Building

When walking through the historic Nevada State Capitol Building's stately halls, visitors will encounter legends of Nevada's past. They may even get a chance to meet with the state's current leaders.

Woodrow Davis—a volunteer who has guided tours of the Capitol for about 14 years—became a docent due to his love of history. “You really can’t do this job unless you’re a history buff,” Davis says. During his time on the job, Davis’ knowledge of Nevada and its Capitol building has multiplied. Here are three hidden historical tales he likes to share with groups of all ages who visit:

Look back in time with these historical itineraries



### The Sandstone Marvel

The Capitol building weighs about 19 million pounds and was built between 1870 and 1871 by local building contractor, Peter Cavanaugh. The two-story, classical revival building with elements of Renaissance Revival and Italianate is primarily constructed of sandstone quarried by the prisoners at the Nevada State Prison, just outside of downtown Carson City.

### Oh Christmas Tree, Oh Christmas Tree

Located on the Capitol grounds, Nevada's state Christmas tree is the largest in the country, standing at over 110 feet tall. For comparison's sake, the next tallest official state Christmas tree is in Iowa, and it's 65 feet tall.

George Washington Gale Ferris Sr., the father of the man who invented the Ferris wheel, planted the tree in 1876.

### Hands-On History

See the wheel of the battleship USS Nevada, the wine glasses used to toast the state's entry into the union, the boxing glove from the famous Jim Jeffries and Jack Johnson match and more in Battle Born Hall. Located in the former Senate Chambers on the second floor of the Capitol, the 2,000-square-foot space includes five exhibit areas that lead visitors on a tour of Nevada's history. “It's very interactive for the kids,” Davis says.



### Visit the Capitol

More than 130 years after its construction, the Nevada State Capitol Building is still actively used and open to all. Its historic grounds are accessible most days, including Saturdays.

“You can come in here anytime,” Davis says, a volunteer tour guide. “This is Nevada, after all.” The building is open to the public Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and on Saturday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Free 1-hour guided tours by docents from the Nevada State Museum take place at 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. every Saturday and include the exterior of the building, nearby memorials and the interior of the building. # FROM MAMMOTH TO MINT

Uncover the history of the Silver State's past and take in key artifacts at the Nevada State Museum and former US Mint

Where can you see the world's largest exhibited Columbian Mammoth and an 1869 coin press still in action today? At the Nevada State Museum in Carson City.

## Pressed into History

The museum building—the former US Mint building—is a historical experience all on its own. Built at the peak of the silver boom in the 1800s, the Carson City Mint minted coins from silver discovered in the Comstock Lode in nearby Virginia City.

"The country was growing in the 1860s, and the services the government could provide were stretched the further you got away from the East coast," Freedman says. "So, getting coins—actual money—into the hands of the populace was not that easy."

Over its lifetime, the mint produced nearly \$50 million face value worth of gold and silver coins.

"The mint's history is pretty fascinating," Freedman says. "The circumstances in which it was created were really unique to Nevada and the resources that were here. The mint is a huge part of that history and the nation's history."

The museum celebrated its 150th anniversary in Feb. of 2020. Between 1870 and 1899, the press minted nearly every type of coin, from coins of the late 1800s to modern pennies, nickels and dimes. Today, it is the only coin press of its time still in operation, producing commemorative medallions for museum visitors, special occasions and historical organizations.

## Mining the Past

Nevada State Museum holds 17 galleries and unique displays, many of which are interactive.

Its natural history section features a variety of animals, from the bones of a prehistoric mammoth found in the Black Rock Desert to an ichthyosaur, which swam the waters of ancient Lake Lahontan. "It's an unusual collection that preserves the story of these animals," Freedman says.

The "Under One Sky" exhibit tells the story of Nevada's first inhabitants through 10,000 year-old artifacts and presents American Indian culture from their perspective and in their own words. "That exhibit was developed in partnership with Native American groups," Freedman says. "It tells an important story."

The museum also includes a replica of a mining town and an underground mine.

"The mining exhibit is one of the most popular exhibits we have," Freedman says. "It was developed in the 1950s by engineers and the mining industry. If you were able to go underground and see the mines during the Comstock, this is what you would have seen. Most people feel like they're in an actual mine."

# ALL ABOARD!

**Now's your chance to go full-steam ahead into one of the most unique and most immersive historical experiences: riding a train through the Carson canyons**

Step into a world where the past comes alive with every whistle blow and where you can feel the thunderous rumble of historic trains under your feet. Every museum exhibit and bump of the tracks offers a sensory feast that encompasses you in the spirit of Nevada's rich railroad history.

Carson City boasts several museums, exhibits and experiences to showcase the preserved history of trains, railroads and the expansion into the West. These include the Nevada State Railroad Museum, the V&T Railway and the Virginia & Truckee Railroad.

## Moving History

When transcontinental rail service began in Nevada in 1869, it also marked a new era for the state and the West.

"The railroads came and fundamentally changed the human machine," Daniel Thielen, the director of the Nevada State Railroad Museum, says.

At the Nevada State Railroad Museum, visitors can take a deep dive into Nevada's railroad history through its collection of locomotives, artifacts, photographs and memorabilia. That's right—these are actual pieces from the good ol' days.

But what if these trains weren't just for admiring? What if you could actually ride one of them? Go beyond learning and climb aboard one of the trains at the museum. Listed as a National Historic Landmark, the museum's gasoline-powered 1910 McKeen Motor Car is the only surviving example of its kind in the US. The museum also offers 25-minute rides on a 401 Edwards Motor Car that was built in 1926 and a steam train.

## Travel through the Mountains

For a more immersive adventure, you'll want to visit the V&T. See the picturesque route from Carson City to Virginia City through a totally new lens—or, should we say, window. Create an unforgettable memory with your friends or family.

"Railroading in northern Nevada is not complete without a trip to a museum, nor is it complete without a trip to the V&T Railway," Thielen says.

From May through October, the V&T takes passengers on a 24-mile, round-trip ride between Nevada's capital and the famed Virginia City. Explore northern Nevada in a way few have before. They even have special events throughout the season:

- Enjoy the beautiful spring weather and celebrate the special women in your life on a train ride. This Mother's Day event is complete with marvelous views and delicious bites.
- Want to trade in the tents and barbecue for a unique train experience this Memorial Day Weekend? The V&T is your answer.
- In November and December, the Polar Express comes alive on the V&T for a 1-hour ride. This wintery adventure is complete with hot chocolate, nibbles and a souvenir silver crotal bell!




## FOLLOW YOUR OWN COMPASS

### And tune into Carson City's history along the way

Love tours and going at your own pace? Take a self-guided audio tour on the Kit Carson Trail. It's a 2.5-mile path where you can explore Carson City's tree-lined neighborhoods and historical buildings, including houses, museums and churches.

Use the app on your smartphone to navigate your way through nearly 50 landmarks. It's easy: Start walking (or biking) around Carson City's historic district until you find a building that interests you, pull out your phone to tap on the pin icon that corresponds to the stop you're at, and immerse yourself in the audio. This lets you be the leader of your day; if you take a break, just pick up where you left off or feel empowered to skip around.



### Don't miss these top stops\*



#### Ferris House

311 3rd St.

This historical home was owned by George Washington Gale Ferris, Sr. from 1869 to 1890.

His son, George Washington Gale Ferris, Jr., came up with the idea for the Ferris wheel from his early days in Nevada, when he watched the big wheel turning near the Mexican mill on the Carson River.



#### Orion Clemens House

502 N. Division St.

Orion Clemens—appointed as Nevada's first territorial secretary by President Abraham Lincoln—built this house in 1862.

Clemens brought along his younger brother, Samuel, from Tennessee. Most people know him as the prolific writer who goes by the name of Mark Twain.



#### Bliss Mansion

608 Elizabeth St.

One of the stops on the Carson City Ghost Walks is the Bliss Mansion. Duane L. Bliss built this house in 1879. It has 15 rooms, 9 marble fireplaces and is built of clear sugar pine and cedar from his Lake Tahoe mill. Standing at over 8,000 square feet, this was once the largest home in Nevada.

Some say they've seen the ghost of Bliss, staring pensively out the windows. (He loved his house so much that he never really left.)

# HIT THE TRAILS

## Explore some of Carson City's top trails through the eyes of local experts

Nestled at the foot of Nevada's Eastern Sierra mountain range, Carson City affords visitors access to many scenic hiking, biking, ATVing or OHVing trails. From expert treks to beginner rides, there's a trail out there for everyone. The trick is finding the right one, and there's no one better to ask than a local.

For hiking and biking trails, we chatted with Pete Doenges, a director with Muscle Powered, a Carson City organization that promotes creating a pedestrian-and-bicycle-friendly infrastructure by maintaining and developing trails and resources.

"I am a passionate hiker and somewhat of a trail builder," Doenges says. "So when I arrived here in Carson, I was drawn to this activity and to the stick-to-itiveness of the people who would guide the hiking, trail building and biking activities in the group."

For off-roading exploration, we reached out to David Clemenson, who helped create the popular Rock Crawlers & Brews event.

"I'm a big off-road enthusiast when it comes to vehicles and rock crawling," Clemenson says.



## Here are the “can’t miss” trails recommended by locals for all tread styles and levels:

### Ash Canyon to Kings Canyon Trail

*Types of Activities:* **Hiking, Biking, Equestrian**  
*Distance:* **14.8 miles (7.4 miles one way)**

Thanks to partnerships and the hard work of many volunteers, the Ash to Kings trail is the flagship trail in Carson City. It features well-built miles of smooth, twisting single-track that connects two scenic Carson City canyons. Hikers and bikers are welcome to access the trail from either canyon. After 2,000 feet in elevation gain, traversers will be rewarded with views of Washoe Lake, Carson River Canyon, the Sierra Nevada Mountains and the valley floor. Crossing a diverse range of trail environments, Ash to Kings crosses two bridges, one of which goes over a waterfall.

“It has a fabulous array of different hiking and biking challenges,” Doenges says. This trail is open to hikers and mountain bikers. Furry friends are welcome, too.

Parking is available at each end of the trail, so hitch a ride from a friend if you just want to go one way for approximately 7 miles.

### The Capital to Tahoe Trail

*Types of Activities:* **Hiking, Biking, Equestrian**

Tahoe is a must-see part of anyone’s trip to northern Nevada. But what if you could see the world-renowned lake AND Nevada’s capital in one trip? Thanks to Muscle Powered, city officials and the community banding together, that’s now possible with the Cap to Tahoe Trail. The 10 mile connector trail offers a non-motorized connection to Lake Tahoe that’s perfect on foot, bike or in the saddle. This means that those willing to take the challenge can start at the steps of the capitol and hike the 16 miles to Lake Tahoe via the Cap to Tahoe Trail.

This trail helps reinforce the fact that the fun expands beyond Lake Tahoe. It’s right here in Carson City! Those in pursuit of a bigger challenge will be excited to hear that this new trail will connect to the Tahoe Rim Trail and, by extension, the Pacific Crest Trail. Or, if you want to be one of the firsts to complete a trek from the stairs of Nevada’s Capitol Building all the way to Canada, your adventure begins here.





## Prison Hill Loop

*Types of Activities:* **Hiking, Biking, Equestrian**

*Distance:* **5.6 miles**

Prison Hill is one of the premier hiking and trail running areas in northern Nevada. The name is no coincidence—there are two prisons (one historic, one operating) next to the mountain: one on the northwest side, and one on the southwest side. Bordered by the Carson River on the east and offers stunning views of the valleys to the west, Prison Hill rises to 5,724 feet and has spectacular views in all directions.

“One of my favorite hikes around here is North loop,” Doenges says. “When you get up into this area of the city, you can look off at the Sierra in one direction and the beautiful Greenbelt of the Carson River off to the east. I’d highly recommend that if people enjoy the desert aesthetic. If you slow down, focus on being in the present and aware, there’s a whole thriving kind of life in the desert.”

## Prison Hill Recreational Area

*Types of Activities:* **Motorcycle, ATV, UTV**

This 2,500-acre natural recreation area offers trails for motorized use on its southern end. There, OHV enthusiasts will find several loops throughout the area and a large staging area for parking.

“You’ve got all kinds of different smaller trails that can be good for dirt bikes, quads, ATVs, UTVs or rock crawlers,” Clemenson says. “There’s a wide variety of technical levels from mild to wild.”

This area just completed renovations in 2022, including improvements such as designated routes, signs and maps. It includes staging area improvements, a new kiosk, toilets, quality trails, a Tot Lot, beginner area, rock crawl and trial areas, and a developed Toad Rock Loop.

## Pine Nut Mountains

*Types of Activities:* **Motorcycle, ATV, UTV**

In the Pine Nut Mountains, riders will find almost 100,000 acres of BLM land, with many trails available to OHV use. The topography of the Pine Nut Mountains ranges from rolling hills to peaks topping 9,000 feet.

“There’s a huge trail system out there, and that’s just wide open,” Clemenson says. “You’ve got lots of hidden lows. You got canyons. You got some ravines in there.”

Carson City presents a variety of un-FORGETTABLE experiences (see what we did there?) within easy driving distance and simpler courses for families and beginners. Even at the height of the summer tourist season, Carson City golf courses are tranquil places to spend the day.


There's no bad choice when selecting a course. Whether you opt for the Comstock/River or Sierra/Comstock at Empire Ranch Golf Course, East or West at Eagle Valley Golf Course, or Silver Oak Golf Course, you're bound to have a fun-filled day in one of the nation's most historically rich capitals.

The Empire Ranch Golf Course offers options for both beginners and pro golfers with 27 holes that overlook the Carson

River. On the other hand, the Eagle Valley (East and West both with 18 holes) and Empire Ranch (Comstock/River and Sierra/Comstock) golf courses are divided up into regions offering a variety of choices depending on experience.

One fairway stands out: the Cadillac Ranch Driving Range at Silver Oak Golf Course. With its inspired approach, the course features buried vintage cars collected since 1974 and hand-painted by students from Doral Academy Red Rock. The car art at the range was influenced by Carson City's deep arts and culture history. There's also the addition of a "Vegas Strong" dedication car in memory of the 58 victims lost at the Route 91 Harvest Festival in 2017.

**Simply put, Carson City is the best-kept secret for recreational golf in the West with its unbeatable prices and mesmerizing scenic backdrop.**

# TRIPLE PLAY

**Go from hiking trail to ski run  
or golf course to hot springs—  
all in one day**

Thanks to Carson City's almost 300 sunny days a year and its diverse environment, the recreation possibilities are practically endless. Want to ski, hike and take a dip in a natural hot spring, all on the same day? Okay! How about walking in the steps of history, acing a hole in one and exploring a scenic trail? Easy peasy. There are infinite possibilities, so here are two pretty perfect triple days and how to do it all.

## All Summer Long

Start a Carson Triple summer day with a visit to one of Carson City's four incredible golf courses. Carson City's amazing fairways give everyone from aspiring pros to hack amateurs a chance to enjoy challenging topography and a stunning Sierra backdrop. After a round, swap your golf shoes for hiking boots and head to one of Carson City's many scenic hiking trails. Carson City's boundaries go all the way to the eastern shore of Lake Tahoe. Hikers can access the Carson River, three backcountry lakes, multiple mountain peaks and some unspoiled shoreline along Lake Tahoe. 

Since the late 19th century, visitors have sought this natural hot spring for its healing and therapeutic properties. The water naturally flows from the spring at temperatures of 121 degrees and is cooled to create a variety of temperatures. Guests can lounge and soak in one of the resort's three outdoor pools that range between 95 to 104 degrees year-round. Prefer to go solo? Head to one of the 10 private hot baths that range a bit higher, from 95 to 110 degrees. The resort also offers an outdoor patio with a 400-square-foot covered area and cold-water drench shower. Another option is to drink, then dip, then eat. Or eat, then drink, then dip. What we're saying is there's no wrong way to do it—except to miss this uniquely Carson City experience.

**Brewery Arts Center offers year-round events, exhibits and performances**

In 1975, a group of artists purchased the historic Carson Brewing Company building and turned it into a community gathering space for artists. Today, the Brewery Arts Center spans two city blocks and includes a 250-seat performance hall in the historic St. Teresa Catholic Church, a sculpture park, the Nevada Artists Association Gallery and an outdoor amphitheater.

Each year, the Brewery Arts Center hosts about 100 events and performances including theater, live music, dance and more. Many of these events are free.

The center's education department also offers classes in painting, sculpting, drawing, pottery, photography, jewelry making, theater, improvisation, dance and music.

In the summer, the Brewery Arts Center's campus hosts a 10-week outdoor concert event that draws bands like The Wailers and Big Bad Voodoo Daddy. The Levitt AMP Carson City Music Series has been around since 2016 and continues to help Carson City flourish. From rock and R&B to jazz and psychedelic cumbia, people of all ages and backgrounds are sure to enjoy the blend of genres that occur throughout the summer.

In addition to performances, classes and exhibits, the center also includes an Artisan Gallery, where locals and visitors can find art unique to Carson City. The shop displays and sells pieces from about 25 local artists. It also sells handmade, artisan Moondance chocolates.

# STEP INTO THE SUPERNATURAL REALM



## The Carson City Ghost Walk fuses history, theater and ghostly apparitions for a spellbinding experience

"In the Victorian era, there was a movement called Spiritualism, which isn't a religious movement as much as one where people can contact the dead," said Mary Bennett, current operator of the Carson City Ghost Walk, celebrating its 30-year anniversary.

Bennett channels Mary Curry, widow of Carson City founder, Abraham Curry. The Widow Curry character explores communicating with her husband who passed away in October 1873.

Evening tours start in June and run through the summer, closing with a daytime event in October for spooky season, the Saturday before Nevada Day. Guests stroll past historic haunted homes on the west side as the folklore is narrated along the way. For the special October walk, guests meet at McFadden Plaza and proceed on a two-hour walking tour where they enter historical homes and meet more of Carson City's lingering spirits of centuries past.

Tours are family-friendly. To keep returning guests on their toes and keep spirits high, the theme changes every year, guaranteeing a reimagined experience.

### Highlights during the tours:

- The Prang House: Originally built in Dayton, NV, the house was moved to this site in Carson City. The house is famous for resident Louis Pang, the father of the American Christmas card.
- The Brewery Arts Center: This building was built in 1874 by the Carson Brewing Company, producer of Tahoe Beer. The building has since been transformed into an arts center.
- The Bliss Mansion: Duane L. Bliss built this huge house in 1879; there are 15 rooms in the 8,000 square feet space. Although it is now a private residence, some people have seen the specter of Bliss appear in the mansion's windows before vanishing.
- The Governor's Mansion: Built in 1909, Denver Dickerson was the first governor to live here with his wife, Una, who was the first governor's wife to give birth in the mansion. It continues to host community events (and spirits).

Just up the street, at 114 North Curry St., you'll find Abell House Antiques. Abell House has been in business for more than 20 years, collecting and selling rare antique finds. Nothing here is run of the mill, making Abell House the perfect place to go if you're looking for unique pieces.

Kaleidoscope, situated at 210 South Carson St, showcases an array of treasures with 12 distinct booths and offerings from 19 individual vendors. Explore a diverse selection, including antiques, vintage items, shabby chic and Western decor, exquisite candles, jewelry, and captivating local art.

If you're looking for a mixture of antique treasures and modern goods, head to Due Sorella (Italian for "two sisters") at 202 North Curry St. The shop sells an ever-evolving mix of antique and new furniture, accent pieces, flatware, linens, jewelry, clothing and more. You may also meet the shop's pets, Sweet Pea the bunny and Lucy and Ricky, the two doves.

To find a great gift for yourself or anyone in your life, head to the Purple Avocado at 904 North Curry St. The Purple Avocado has been voted the best gift shop in Carson City, and when you visit, you'll understand why. The shop sells gifts for people of all ages and all tastes.

To find a souvenir from your Nevada getaway, swing by the Nevada Day Store at 1013 S. Carson St or at High Desert Pine 206 N. Carson St. They sell apparel and more souvenirs to help you commemorate your trip.

# HONORING HISTORY

Discover the story of the Stewart Indian School and  
the legacy of American Indian communities



For 90 years, the Stewart Indian School served as the only off-reservation Indian boarding school in Nevada. In 1890, the Bureau of Indian Affairs established the school as a part of the American Indian boarding schools project, a program that removed children from their families in an attempt to eradicate American Indian culture.

Children and youth from Nevada, California, Arizona and New Mexico representing 200 tribes were relocated to schools like the Stewart Indian School, where they were forbidden to speak their native languages or dress in traditional garb.

The Stewart Indian School operated from 1890 until 1980. Today, the Stewart Indian School is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Part of it has also been renovated to include the Stewart Indian School Cultural Center and Museum. It is dedicated to sharing the stories of American Indian children who attended the school, highlighting their experiences of resilience and triumph despite the hardships they faced. Serving as both a museum and a gathering place, it showcases exhibits of

contemporary Native art, hosts educational activities and fosters a sense of community among Stewart alumni and their families.

"This historic building is coming back to life," Stacey Montooth, the Executive Director at the Nevada Indian Commission, says. "The stories of the students, the alumni and their families will be stored and shared within those walls. Everything in it is as told by our students. You cannot find a more authentic reflection of the history and the impact of the Stewart Indian School."

The Storytelling Room provides insight into Nevada's four main language groups and serves as a space for tribal members to share stories, conduct craft demonstrations and screen documentaries. There are also changing exhibits of class photos and student art, along with a Research Room containing archival materials and an exhibit on the craftsmanship of Hopi stonemasons. Additionally, the Wa-Pai-Shone Gallery showcases contemporary art by Great Basin Native artists.

The museum and cultural center are open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Everyone is welcome and encouraged to visit. Additionally, the

museum is free to enter, and they also now offer special classes throughout the year.

To better understand Nevada's modern cultural identity, attend the Father's Day Powwow hosted at the Stewart Indian School. During this holiday weekend, you can experience a variety of dancing, arts and crafts, food and storytelling from the hundreds of tribal representatives. Admission to the Powwow is free.

"The history of The Great Basin, of Nevada and of the United States is not complete without the knowledge of the Indian boarding schools," Montooth says. "To be a well-rounded, civic-minded citizen, you have to know about the federal government's intentions, their actions, and of course, the ramifications. There is no place on earth to get a better account."

Whether you're dining at a cozy café, artisanal bistro or a long-time local favorite, when you eat in Carson City, you're tasting the community's locality, care and creativity.

"In Carson City, being a small business owner is always about the people," says Jenny Lopiccolo, owner of Piazza, which serves wine, cocktails and small plates in Bob McFadden Plaza in downtown Carson City. She and her husband, Mark, returned home from traveling through Italy and Spain with a vision: to create a similar experience in Carson City's own Piazza, with good wines, great cocktails, stellar service and food options worth getting excited about.

Part of that excitement stems from Piazza serving seasonal fare featuring locally sourced farm-to-table ingredients.

That farm-to-table approach plays a significant role in shaping the menus at other local restaurants, Cucina Lupo and Great Basin Brewing Company. Both are owned by chef and restaurateur, Mark Estee, and his partners, Nick Meyer and Tommy Lynette. At both places, diners can find dishes crafted with regionally grown ingredients, such as Park Ranch Meats from Minden and produce from farms in the Great Basin Food Shed.

Estee also believes one of the region's most local food experiences can be found at a Basque restaurant. "There is Basque food and traditions, and there's also Basque dining. It's really important to experience both because they're quintessential to Carson and northern Nevada."



Eve's Eatery, Carson City's newest restaurant nestled just downtown. With unique flavors and beautiful presentation @eveseaterynv is serving up smiles with every plate. Plus there's a homemade pasta bar to take to go for those nights you need a night off. Not to mention, there's gluten free, vegan and vegetarian options.

If someone in your party is craving a hearty American burger, but you're jonesing for some Asian flavors, you'll definitely want to visit Tee Jay's Corner Cafe. Opened in 2020, this east-meets-west-inspired cafe brings a passion for good food and good customer service to Carson City. Their drunken noodles, wonton soup and curries are all fan favorites.

Nashville Social Club also brings a different style of cooking to Carson City. Taste buds, meet southern comfort food (plus plant-based and keto-friendly dishes). If you're a fan of Nashville hot fried chicken, this is the place to be. Another great feature of this restaurant is that you can catch a show with your meal. There's a variety of country performances and even an opportunity to move your feet with line dancing instruction.

# FLY YOU TO THE MOON

**Embark on a celestial journey to the stars, planets and moon from the Jack C. Davis Observatory in Carson City. This is where science and awe intertwine.**



Delve into the mysteries of the cosmos at the Jack C. Davis Observatory, a captivating research-level facility open to all. Located on the northern side of Western Nevada College's (WNC) campus, this astronomical haven enables you to immerse yourself in our solar system and space's history.

Named after the school's founding president of Western Nevada College, the Davis Observatory had its "First Light" on May 15, 2003. Astronaut Buzz Aldrin—that's right, the second man to walk on the moon—gave a lecture on opening day. They celebrated their 20th anniversary in 2023, which they commemorated with local astrophotography printed on notecards.

Situated in the majestic Sierra Nevada mountains, the observatory offers a unique vantage point for stargazing enthusiasts. Interior and exterior telescopes allow you to marvel at the night sky.

Jack C. Davis Observatory also serves as a hub of knowledge and discovery, offering classes and lectures that keep the community informed about the latest astronomy advancements. Come to a star party hosted every Saturday, or a year-round Lecture Series on the third Saturday of every month, featuring engaging topics like scientists and mathematicians, killer asteroids, Hubble Telescope images and popular science fiction movies.

If you visit during a time when a lecture isn't being held, there's still a really cool feature to explore: The Planetary Walkway. This landscaped path connects the main WNC campus with the Jack C. Davis Observatory and is lined with massive sandstone monuments sculpted by artistic inmates from the Nevada State Prison when it had a quarry. The stones feature carved images of the planets, along with information about each in our solar system and a dedication to the donors.
